Nathaniel Massie


A young Virginian named Nathaniel Massie had become quite a good surveyor. He was very familiar with the Virginia Military District and had been hired by a lot of veterans to locate their land. Through land payments for surveying work, he eventually owned quite a bit of land in what is now Chillicothe and Ross County.

Nathaniel got a good look at the new lands before many of the new settlers came to Ross County. He selected some of the best lands for himself. Nathaniel wanted to sell some of his land, but, who would want to buy land where there were no nearby towns. He began to make plans for a settlement in the heart of the wooded lands he had surveyed. Nathaniel placed advertisements in Kentucky and Virginia newspapers which offered free land to the first 100 settlers to come to his new town to live.

In March of 1796, Nathaniel and Rev. Robert Finley organized a group of about 40 men from Virginia and Kentucky to begin his new settlement. They traveled up the Scioto River, some in boats and some by land from the Ohio River settlement of Manchester.

On April 1, they set up camp where Paint Creek empties into the Scioto River. He named the new settlement Prairie Station. This spot proved to be too low and flooding from the Paint and Scioto would be a problem. The better location for their new town was found just up the Scioto along a large bend in the river. The land sat upon a high bank surrounded by hills which added to the beauty of the setting.

Clearing the land for the new town began quickly. At first the settlement was called Massieville, but then Nathaniel determined the name to be Chillicothe, a Shawnee Indian word which meant "Principle town."
